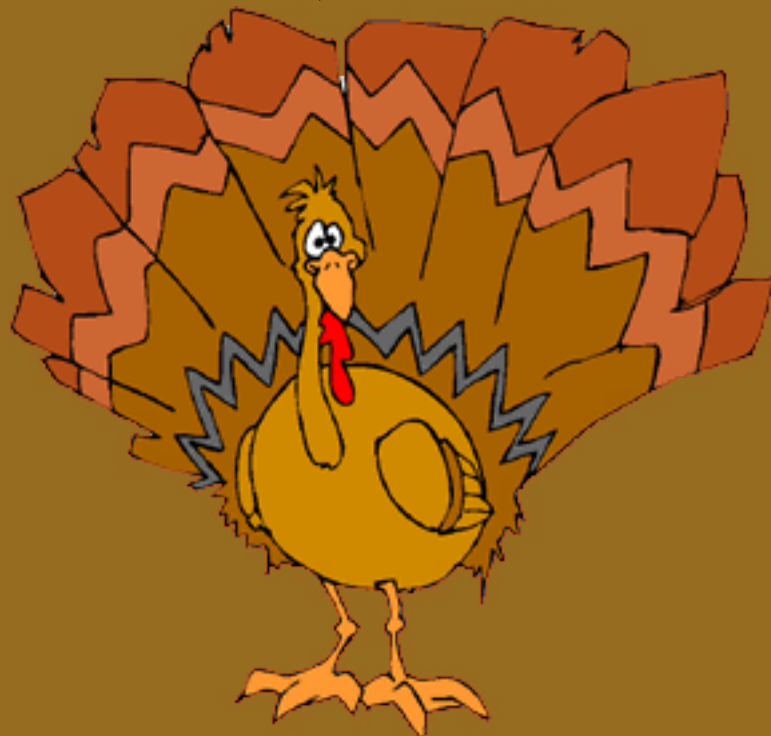

COMMUNITY SERVICE/CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTION IDEAS

BASIC HS

Basic students and staff are exceeding the "basic" reputation. Our amazing staff that we are so thankful for has allowed all of their students, clubs, and sports to participate in raising money for breast cancer. The staff has also helped us stay involved in our feeder schools. The seventy-two students in student council have traveled to our feeder schools to help them with their activities and carnivals. We have gone to Robert L. Taylor elementary school to help them with their BBQ, Dooley elementary to help with their fall carnival; we have also helped with Smalley Elementary fall carnival, we volunteered at Brown Middle School, and helped serve ice cream at Sue H. Morrow's ice cream social. The student council also participated in a PINK lemonade stand where we sold pink lemonade for fifty cents or one dollar for a large. All the supplies were bought by student council and not refunded by the school. In just a small amount of one week we were able to raise two hundred and fifty dollars to donate to the DigPink campaign. Our great volleyball team participated in a DigPink volleyball game where all the proceeds went to the DigPink campaign. At the game it cost three dollars to get in, but if you were wearing pink then you were able to get into the game for only one dollar. We called this pack the gym night, we filled the gym with as much pink as we could. All the money that was made at the concession stand, in raffle ticket sales, and in other items sold at the game the profit was donated to the DigPink campaign. PALO VERDE HS

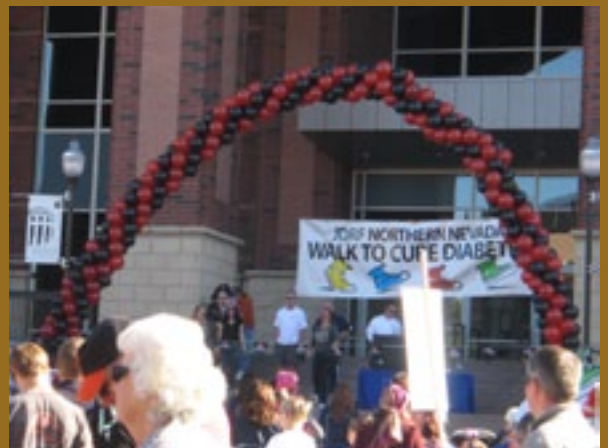
